When is the Best Time to Repot My Orchid?

Orchids are best repotted when they are in active growth. Orchids are usually in active growth shortly after blooming when they send out new shoots and/or leaves and new roots begin to form. Be careful not to break the tips of the growing roots or the new growth of the plant.

Phalaenopsis are very forgiving and can be repotted just about any time they are not in bloom. On the other extreme, Dendrobiums prefer to be repotted only as new growth appears.

There will always be instances when an orchid must be repotted immediately (for example if the pot breaks, or the media is severely decomposed) in which case be as gentle as you can.





Hanging Orchids Like Mother Nature

Most of the orchids we grow are epiphytes, meaning they grow on trees in their natural habitat. Orchids in the Cattleya family are well suited for mounting. Common mounts include tree fern plaques or poles, cypress, cork, driftwood (well soaked to remove salt), cedar and grape wood. Mounted orchids will require more frequent watering. Orchids can be attached to the mount with plastic zip ties, nylon stockings or fishing line. Place a small pad of sphagnum moss or coconut fiber husk between the plant and the mount to encourage new roots. Many growers start the plant off horizontal and then hang it when roots have attached to the mount.

Mounting orchids will be the topic of our July 11th Growers Clinic.

Jay Loeffler Photo Composition Tips Continued from Last Month

Composition Tip 2: Fill the frame

When you're shooting a large photo it can be hard to know how big your subject should be in the frame, and how much you should zoom in. Leaving too much empty space in a scene is the most widespread compositional mistake. It makes your subject smaller and leaves viewers confused about what they're supposed to be looking at.

To avoid these problems you should zoom in to fill the frame, or get closer to the subject in question. The first approach flattens the perspective of the shot and makes it easier to control or exclude what's shown in the background, but physically moving closer can give you a more interesting take on things. Try Both.

- 1. Filling the frame makes the object larger.
- 2. High off-center placement makes a more interesting scene.



Photo Composition Tip 3: Aspect ratio

The aspect ratio of an image describes the proportional relationship between its width and its height.

It's easy to take every picture with the camera held horizontally. Try turning it to get a vertical shot instead, adjusting your position or the zoom setting as you experiment with the new style. You can often improve on both horizontal and vertical shots by cropping the photo later.

- 1. You can crop the shot later if the object is too tall to shoot horizontally
- 2. Turn the camera and try an upright shot to see different and maybe improved results.

Monthly Quick Tip from Your Growers Clinic Team



With the onset of our "wet season" it's probably a good idea to get ahead of the potential issues caused by insects, fungus and diseases. One way is to add a Tbsp of BioAdvanced Rose & Flower Care granules to each plant. The May 9 Growers Clinic was well-attended and the 37 attendees walked away with a trove of useful information. A new and, hopefully better, seating arrangement was used and designed to improve the overall experience by putting the Orchid ER "patients" in the center of the room.

Of course, Stephanie Luberger did her usual masterful job in discussing the ins and outs, with input from Naoki Kawamura and Jimmy Thomas, of dealing with the pests that can adversely affect our favorite plants. Also included was an eye-opening reference that all insects found in and around our orchids are not bad! Lacewings and Lady Bugs are actually good! They augment our work by feeding on many of the very pests we're trying to eliminate! Her positions of "Use 'Natural' products first, then, if needed, move onto the more lethal chemicals", and "Use only the 'Natural' products outside your greenhouses/pool cages so as to protect the pollinators (bees, butterflies, etc.) and keep the more lethal products for use INSIDE your greenhouses/pool cages" were well-received.

Of course, the ubiquitous cautionary statements of "Please Read and Follow Label Directions" were emphasized throughout the evening. Last, but not least, luckily, our Orchid ER had a rather slow night, with only a few "Patients", who were diagnosed and released for treatment and recuperation at home. Our thanks to all who attended and made this yet another fun meeting!
