Monthly Quick Tip from Your Growers Clinic Team



NOVEMBER

- Prepare plants for cold.
- Reduce fertilizing.
- Place dormant plants in dry area.
- Supplement potassium and magnesium for winter health.



And, of course, cleaning up your growing area and plants by removing dead leaves helps to keep your plants healthy. This should be done throughout the year as needed.

November 9th Growers Clinic

If you've looked at your calendar, or been in some of the "big box" stores lately, you'll see that we're creeping on that time of year again. Yep, two "seasons" are just around the corner. Those being Winter (Ewwww!!!) and the Orchid Shows (Yayyyy)! So, in preparation for both, on Thursday, November 9, the Growers Clinic Team will discuss **tips and tricks for protecting your orchids from the cold weather as well as what to do and how to prepare them for the upcoming shows**. And, of course, the meeting will offer our Orchid ER. Members should remember to wear their VAOS Name Tags, please. There will be a Sign-in Sheet for guests. As usual, the meeting will begin at 7:00pm in Room F of the Venice Community Center. You can park on the left side of the building and enter through the side door.



After Hurricane Orchid Care

Many/most of us were able to do what we could to prepare our orchids for Hurricane Milton. Moving them into garages, placing them on or near the ground to protect them from wind, placing them among the shrubs to try and give them some protection...but, despite all our best intentions, they probably succumbed to some sort of damage, either from too much water, too much wind or, conversely, not enough water and not enough light.

In any event, now that life has returned to some sort of normalcy, and we certainly feel sorry for those who are not quite there yet, I found an interesting short article on the <u>Better-Gro.com Blog</u> that may be of help. To wit...

Storms are traumatic for us as well as our plants. Plan to have plenty of fungicide and bactericide to treat orchids after the storm has passed. Orchids may receive too much water during a storm (indoors or outdoors) and may not dry out as quickly as they should. Watch your plants very closely for the telltale signs of an infection.

This made me recall an axiom from our friend, fellow VAOS member and VAOS Show and vendor, Jim Roberts, "When in doubt, dry it out!". So, if your plants WERE subjected to large amounts of rain, you'll want to dry them out for at least a few days, then apply fungicide (Draconil or similar) and bactericide (Physan 20, Pool Algaecide or similar) as per label directions. When treating orchids with a fungicide, it is best to dry them out completely before applying the fungicide; this ensures the fungicide can properly adhere to the plant's surface and maximize its effectiveness. A dry orchid leaf allows the fungicide to better contact the plant's surface increasing its chance of reaching fungal spores, while applying fungicide to wet leaves can dilute the solution and reduce its effectiveness.

VAOS 2024 GIFTS & DONATIONS

Every year the VAOS makes financial donations to organizations that support orchid education and conservation. We support the American Orchid Society (AOS), the Florida North Central Judging Center (FNCJC) and provide scholarships or donations to educational or research organizations that support orchid research and conservation.

Earlier this year VAOS made donations to Dr. Lawrence Zettler to publish his book "Saving Orchids" and to PhD candidate Adam Herdman, Univ. of Florida, to help fund his orchid research. In September the VAOS board of directors approved donations to the AOS (\$2000) and the FNCJC (\$2000). In addition, in October we made \$300 donations to five of our local vendors who participate in our annual show who sustained hurricane damage to their greenhouses. If you would like to provide additional support to our vendors you may reach out to them directly. They are Accent Orchids, Florida Orchid House, Florida SunCoast Orchids, Orchid Envy and Plantio La Orquidea.

. The AOS supports world-wide orchid conservation. As an affiliate of the AOS, we support their mission each year with a financial donation. The FNCJC located in Tampa hosts monthly judging events where members may enter their plants for AOS awards. The judges who come to Venice each year to judge our show are affiliated with this center and they travel at their own expense.

The VAOS was formed 59 years ago as a 501(c)(3) not for profit corporation. Our Bylaws state our mission: "to encourage, organize and support educational activities among its members in order to develop and extend knowledge concerning the cultivation and hybridization of orchids and to promote the conservation and protection of native species".

VAOS revenue comes from proceeds from our annual orchid show and from membership dues. These funds cover our administrative and operating expenses, provide subsidies for member social events and excursions, cover speaker fees and expenses, fund our reserve fund and fund annual gifts and donations. Our Bylaws require us to retain one to three years' reserve to cover operating expenses. The Treasurer Report is published monthly in our newsletter.

We are pleased that we are able to support these important organizations and research programs through financial donations and will continue to do so. .

Greetings from the Swamp!

My name is Adam Herdman and I have just begun the second year of my PhD program at the University of Florida. Although I have been involved in orchid research for many years, there still are so many questions that have gone unanswered, this is at the very foundation of my program here. Since the last newsletter, my program here at the University of Florida has been progressing very quickly. After spending six months of work to obtain permits and permissions, I was finally able to start conducting the research this spring. Many of the projects we embarked on this spring focus on large scale population dynamics and spatial distribution for the Ghost Orchid.



This July, I was pleased to help close out a ten-year survey of the Ghost Orchid populations on the Florida Panther National Wildlife Refuge. This project has been instrumental in the development of my career path and has helped to define the projects that are going to be conducted in future. I believe field monitoring is critical to any conservation efforts because it has the capacity to tie any data observed in the lab back to the landscape. This information will be used to project the population into the future and gauge the future status of these fragmented populations.


It is because of the importance of these monitoring efforts that I decided to record a reintroduced population alongside the wild populations. After seven years of revisiting the same 123 plants, only 25 have persisted. Our findings have helped to quantify the constraints and challenges to future reintroduction efforts. We have found that the Ghost Orchids there


are having trouble reproducing, with many flowers but no viable capsules produced. These low rates of survival may seem like a failure, but it represents a brand-new population that did not exist before and is an important step forward in conservation of the species.

From the observations made in that reintroduction, I determined that we needed to conduct a large scale population genetics project to have a look the populations that have been observed to be struggling. We are still working on collections across Southwest Florida, but so far have sampled from 87 plants across 8 different sites. If all things run smoothly we should have reportable information on how similar the populations are by next year.

To help identify future field sites, we have begun deploying data loggers into the landscape to look at the local temperature and the humidity for each of the sites. In recording this information, the hope is to help identify abiotic conditions in situ that will also greatly assist in acclimatizing the plants in the greenhouse before putting plants out in the swamp. This project was also paired with other sites out at Audubon Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary, where the Ghost Orchids can be found 60 feet up in the canopy. To help us get to these remote plants, we teamed up with Mac Stone and his team to climb these ancient cypress trees. Every day the loggers will record the conditions at the plants and tell us how these factors fluctuate seasonally.

In the lab, we are working hard to digest the valuable information that has been collected in the field and pair it with experiments that will meaningfully contribute to our





across a range of temperatures, the hope is to identify the conditions that are ideal for germination as well as the extremes. We have already begun growing Ghost Orchid seed in the lab at UF since 2015 and have recorded more information on the stages of growth.

I have been very lucky along this journey to have such supportive mentorship, and these projects would not be possible without Dr. Carrie Reinhardt-Adams and Dr. Hector Perez. I have come along way and have learned much about what it means to manage primary research projects that interface with land managers. It has been very satisfying to watch these initiatives develop when they were only an idea just one year ago. I am excited for the future of this program and look forward to writing to you again in another year.

Conservation of our native orchid species often falls to a few key individuals and organizations. Without the overwhelming support and dedication from Venice Area Orchid Society, none of this work would have been possible. Thank you for your support.


